Tobias Wolff is one of the great masters of the short story. He has a remarkable ability to express deep truths of the human condition and to do so with great warmth, humor, and compassion. This particular story, "Deep Kiss," not only explores the beauty and power of a young love and of a kiss (when it's the right kiss) but of the solace that touch and connection with another person provides, perhaps particularly in times of anguish. Furthermore, it is a story about how we sometimes carry those we love with us all our lives. Their physical presence may leave us, but our feelings for them remain. It is an acknowledgment of an essential loneliness of our inner lives, of conflicting and contradictory desires and impulses within us, of secrets and longing of which others may know nothing.

Can goodness win?

For George Saunders' character in his short story, "Victory Lap," 15-year-old Allison Pope, the answer is simple, "To do good, you just have to decide to do good. You have to be brave." That answer, Saunders recalls, was the beginning of the story. "As soon as she said that, I started to get the plot. As an author, you say, 'hmm really? Let's find out if that's true.'"

Like Virginia Woolf's stream of consciousness, Saunders inhabits the "mind state" of his characters—that never ending negotiation each of us has with ourselves. Here too is found the presence of those who have helped form those thoughts and the theories adopted as a way to channel our thoughts to meet a desired end—a multitude of causal effects that inform that decision "to do good." Saunders approaches this investigation with humor and empathy; the kindness he shows towards our human failings seems to me an act of grace.

Today, when it seems that a darkening divide has spread across our nation, it can often seem an act of bravery to do good. And that decision, more urgent now than ever.



Tobias Wolff (author, "Deep Kiss") is an American writer best known for his short stories and memoirs, particularly *This Boy's Life: A Memoir* (1989, winner of the Los Angeles Times Book Award) and *In Pharaoh's Army: Memories of the Lost War* (1994). Other works include *The Barracks Thief* (PEN/Faulkner Award), *Back in the World, In the Garden of the North American Martyrs, The Night In Question, Our Story Begins: New and Selected Stories* (The Story Prize), and *Old School.* His work has been anthologized in many, many collections, and published in *The New Yorker*, among other magazines. Other awards include the PEN/Malamud Award for Excellence in Short Fiction, the Stone Award for Lifetime Literary Achievement, The Whiting Award for Fiction and Nonfiction, and the Rea Award for Excellence in the Short Story. In 2015, Tobias Wolff received a National Medal of Arts from President Barack Obama.

Word for Word previously performed "Bullet in the Brain," "Lady's Dream," "In the Garden of the North American Martyrs," "Sanity," "Down to Bone," and "Firelight."

George Saunders (author, "Victory Lap") is a 2006 MacArthur Fellow and the author of *Tenth of December*, a finalist for the National Book Award, and the winner of the inaugural Folio Prize (for the best work of fiction in English) and the Story Prize (best short story collection). His recent novel, *Lincoln in the Bardo*, a #1 New York Times Bestseller, won the 2018 Man-Booker Prize. He teaches at Syracuse University.

Word for Word participated in readings of *Lincoln in the Bardo* at Jewish Community Center of San Francisco and at Shakespeare and Company in Paris.


Molly Benson, a Bay Area actor, director, and voiceover

Jim Cave (Production Manager, Lighting Design) Jim has designed lights for numerous Word for Word productions, most recently *Lucia Berlin: Stories, All Aunt Hagar's Children* and *Holiday High Jinx*. 


ARTISTIC DIRECTOR SUSAN HARLOE

CHARTER MEMBER DELIA MACDOUGALL

When I was a child my mother would make dinners to feed the actors at our local community theater during their long days of tech. She enlisted the help of her six children. If we prepared the meal in time, we were allowed to sit in the back seat of the theater and watch the rehearsal, and after the actors were fed and we finished the dishes, we could sneak back again to see the very first dress rehearsal. Sitting in the dark witnessing the workings of the actors and designers was like being allowed to watch a magician create a magic trick, the crafting of which seemed to me even more spectacular for having revealed the mechanics behind it. That is where I have discovered a driving passion, in that act of creation. 25 years ago, I found a home in Word for Word, alongside the dearest of friends to live a life in pursuit of passion. It has never ceased to be magical.

Jane met Sue through Book-It and later connected me with Sue in San Francisco. Sue generously included me in the mix for the creation of Word for Word. I came full circle with the form. The work I have done with the company, both as actor and director, is the most rewarding of my career.





CHARTER MEMBER NANCY SHELBY





ABOUT YOUTH ARTS

Word for Word's Youth Arts Program is at the heart of Word for Word. Our first performances were in schools and libraries, bringing the excitement and joy of literature, language, and live performance to all. In 1998 we formalized our arts education programming with our School & Library Tour, which brought children's literature from around the world to Bay Area student audiences, as well as student performance workshops and residencies in schools. The touring component of our arts education programming ended in 2008, but we continue to take students through the rigorous and imaginative process of transforming fiction into performance, showing them how language can come alive and bring people together. One of the highlights of our work with the Youth Arts program has been the expansion of our relationship with Greq Sarris, an amazing writer as well as the Tribal Chairman of the


Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (FIGR)—the Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people of Sonoma County. Greg's story "Slaughterhouse," from his book Grand Avenue was one of the first stories Word for Word ever produced as a run in a theater, as opposed to a one-off performance in a school or a library. That show sparked a 20 plus year friendship and mutual admiration society between Word for Word and Greg. We've since produced more of his stories and, in 2008, we commissioned him to write two stories for the S&L Tour, one for elementary schools and one for high schools. Greg had never written for young children before and was excited when he was able to share a Miwok legend about his great-great grandfather, Tom Smith, a powerful medicine man. That story —"How Tom Smith Caused the 1906 Earthquake"—was a great success with elementary school audiences and sparked Greg to write a whole cycle of stories inspired by Miwok and Pomo legends called How a Mountain Was Made. That collection,

in turn, sparked us to create a performance for children and their families from those stories, which we've performed twice at Z Space, as well as several other locations in Northern California. This past June we performed Greg's stories for several hundred tribe members and their children as an introduction to our theatre program for the FIGR summer camp. We were honored to be invited by the tribe to create an arts program for their children and so proud of those kids when they performed Greg's stories this past July. It was a thrill to see them so proudly perform the stories of their people. This is what we hope when we bring Word for Word to young people: that it will foster confidence, pride in themselves, and enthusiasm for art and culture of all kinds. We look forward to more collaborations with Greg, the FIGR and their children. And we're excited to see what art will inspire in all the children we work with in the future.
